The Royal Couple-Princess Margaret and Lord Snowdon, Sir Alexander Bustamante, Norman Manley and many, other dignitaries were present as the anthem of England was sung for the final time with the lowering of the Union Jack. Anticipation filled the air as the moment everyone was waiting for was finally here as the Jamaican flag was hoist. Applause erupted from the crowd as the black, green and gold flag waved brilliantly in the sky. Our national anthem was sung for the first time with such pride and honour. The lights went off and fireworks illuminated the skies.

Jamaica greeted its Independence with spontaneous outpouring of joy and pride. The popular music at the time was the "Ska". Bunny Grant was the Champ. Zari-Jane Coleman, an ICHS graduate who attended UWI, was selected to be Jamaica's flag-bearer for the IAAF World Championships in Athletics in South Korea. This amazing young lady taught herself to speak the Korean using websites and literature. However, she needed assistance raising funds for her trip. A collaborative effort was made by various alumnae chapters to assist her with funds, the Toronto Chapter provided her with JMD\$20000.

The Sr James Vincent award of CN\$1000 was given to Herona Thompson – she also received the Jamaica Independence (Female) Scholarship based on her excellent results in her CXC examinations and placed first in the entire Caribbean in Geography Unit 1. She was also one of the 6 delegates who represented Jamaica at the 10th Annual Caribbean Youth Science Forum (CYSF) in Trinidad during the period August 7th to 14th, 2011.

The association also provided the Lisa Narcisse award of CN\$200 to Consonya Smith. We have also provided JMD \$600,000 to purchase some much needed equipment for the Physics lab, and JMD\$400,000 towards the refurbishing and equipping of the lecture hall.

We have had quite a few other social fun events this year. Our first in a long time "Royal Tea Party" in September at the Rouge River Community Centre was charming and well enjoyed by all as we had an opportunity to labrish about the ole times. I would like to sincerely thank again the committee and non- committee members who helped in this event as it was a lot of hard work to put together the delectable sweets.

In October we had a belly full of laughs as we supported Marcia Brown in her stage performance of "I Need to Know My Father – it was dramatic, suspenseful, funny and even a tear jerker for the finale!! The story unfolds of a young girl who is the product of a shunned union who through clever questioning and some unexpected happenstance discovers who is her father and lifts the shame/curse that attended the women in her family before her.

The young girl attended ICHS - seeing the ICHS uniform was quite nostalgic. Marcia Brown generously donated a portion of the proceeds to our alma mater - again many thanks Marcia! It was an outstanding performance and well executed!! I would like to thank you for supporting us in all our endeavours to further promote the valuable role that ICHS plays in developing phenomenal women of yesterday, today and tomorrow.

### Sister Angella's Message



Greetings to all of you, gathered in the name of Immaculate Conception High School and in support of this wonderful institution.

Just to keep you posted, we (convent, high and prep) have installed security cameras. The control room is here at the convent and I have been in the thick of things as far as securing and training monitors is concerned. During 2011 the prep school had at least one parent's motor vehicle window smashed in and valuables stolen. In June, a high school teacher's car was broken into and the ignition dismantled. Something scared the robbers away. In September a high school parent's car was stolen from in front of the Science block and in December a convent car was stolen from the rear

of the convent. All these incidents occurred during the normal busy hours of 8am - 4pm. Of course, I have not listed them all. So we have had to channel chunk of funds into the installation of cameras. C'est la vie! February 3, we had our first Spirit Day at the high school. Three years ago when I shared with students my observation that school spirit was not strong, they gave some reasons for this and also offered solutions. Among the solutions was having a Spirit Day. There was a focus on the history of the school and its successes. Alumnae visited and shared about their own experiences as students. Teachers donned the school uniform. A marching band led the students around the sunken garden (I watched that from the convent...absolutely wonderful). There was a competition to design a t-shirt for the day and a Grade 11 student (the daughter of an alumnae) won that. The day was a huge success.

Herona Thompson is our top student who left Grade 13 in 2011.

She received the Jamaica Independence (Female) Scholarship based on her excellent results in her CXC examinations. She sat 10 subjects in 2009 at the CSEC Level and received 10 distinctions. She sat 5 subjects at the CAPE 1 Level (remember that with CXC, students sit exams at the end of Lower Six and again at the end of Upper Six) and got 5 distinctions and repeated the performance for CAPE 2. Most students are only allowed to sit four subjects at a time. We only allow the highest achievers to sit 5.

She placed first in the entire Caribbean in Geography Unit 1.

We have made some of the needed improvements to the New Physics lab. We still have some funds left to purchase more equipment. Other major improvements to the AVs. Painted, tiled, ceiling replaced and projectors installed. The girls are absolutely thrilled.

Here are photos of some of the items purchased with the funds given by the Toronto Chapter. The teachers - and students - are extremely grateful. Remember that only a few months ago these cupboards had absolutely no equipment. They did not even have locks on them. Thanks again!









The last thing I will leave with you for now is that our librarian of two years has been making a MAJOR impact. Students actually want to visit the library, and not just for the computers. There is now a Heritage Corner, an excellence corner and comfortable space for reading.

Just to keep you informed, our only focus (in terms of capital expenditure) over the next few months is on lowering our electricity bill and that will mean, in the first stages, going solar. In some key areas, if it is God's will, I have eight more years here before retirement steps in. I would certainly like to see us with an auditorium and an additional 3 classrooms on the Sixth Form block by that time. I am quite happy with the progress we have been making in various aspects of school life. I can only express gratitude for the invaluable support you continue to give.




